Applications to most programmes are to be made <u>one year ahead</u> and exchange in final semester is not recommended. Start thinking about your plan by following these steps. Make use of the resources listed above to work out the details. Mark your actions on the semester timetable.

3	1		<ul> <li>Step 3: Decide which year to study abroad. Consider feasibility and check syllabus carefully. Do you need to adjust your whole study plan to fit this in without risking delayed graduation? (E.g. What courses you might miss while on exchange, such as a FY course?)</li> </ul>	
	2		<ul> <li>Step 4: Apply before deadline which varies from programme to programme. Sign up for English language Test (e.g. IELTS) early if you do not have valid test result. While application to HKUWW Exchange usually closes in the beginning of December, IAO's short-term summer programmes still accept applications in March (final round).</li> <li>Step 5: Plan your course lists after being accepted by the host university. Do you want to transfer the credits – as major/minor requirements, Common Core or free electives? Plan for some back-up courses and get them pre-approved by Faculty first. Don't forget to apply for Leave of Absence in advance.</li> </ul>
